Reaching beyond what you *know* you can do, beyond what you've done...It can be scary and exciting – at the same time. And it's central to what Mayhew tries to encourage in the boys, whether on Mayhew Island in the heart of the summer or in any of the 47 New Hampshire towns and cities where the staff work so diligently alongside the boys, every month between summers.

It's not easy, for the boys or the staff – or any of the parents, trustees, contributors, alumni, volunteers and others who stand up to make Mayhew happen. This *reaching beyond* is hard stuff. Really hard. You find lots of anxiety and disappointment along the way. But with Mayhew, you also find others who believe *you can*, especially in those moments when that's the very last thing you believe about yourself. There's a special camaraderie built on one simple reality: we're all striving and sometimes struggling to reach beyond what we know we can do, beyond what we've already done. Here's a sampling of where this can lead:

Dan at the end of his first year: "It makes me feel like a leader and I use that with my friends and help them out."

Gage's mom, following his first summer: "My son has come home a young man...He is very polite; he regards my feelings and statements. He is more patient with me, friends and others. I am amazed and love the change. I cannot thank [Mayhew] enough for helping my son and his accomplishments!"

Blake, 17 years after Mayhew: "I had some hard times in elementary school but after completing Mayhew I got in a lot less fights, and I was more interested in becoming friends with those I would otherwise pick on or fight. I also see a strong connection in my life now as I am working toward being a teacher and giving kids a positive role model."

On behalf of Blake, Gage, Dan, the 193 boys benefitting from Mayhew's support – right now – and the more than 1,975 alumni before them, thank you for all you do to help the boys reach beyond!

Since 1982, Michelle has been a leading force, too - serving as Mayhew's Director of Administration for the last 20 years. With every challenge Mayhew has faced - and there have been significant ones, for sure - she has stood up with an understated but steely resolve and a chuckling humor that puts everything in perspective.

Nearly twenty-five years ago, on a frigid January evening in the terrifying light of the flames consuming Mayhew Island's Lodge and seriously jeopardizing Mayhew's very existence, Michelle, Trustee Dick Cowern and alum Garvin Eastman (who is now a Mayhew trustee himself) caught a moment amid all the firefighting from the Newfound Lake ice and wept together. That Michelle, who has a significant fear of crossing over the ice, was on the lake at all spoke volumes of how dire this moment was and how much she wanted to do anything she could to help. In the weeks and months and years since, Michelle hasn't ever stopped doing what she can to help Mayhew grow stronger for the boys.

In February, when she announced she would be retiring at the end of 2014, there were initially some "What will Mayhew do without Michelle" moments, some feelings probably not all that unlike those Michelle, Dick and Garvin felt as they hugged and cried on the Newfound Lake ice that frightening and pivotal evening in 1990. Just like then, however, Michelle has been a crucial member of the team working to make the next step a very successful one. Thanks to all that Michelle has done for so long, Mayhew is stepping forward strongly. And when the challenges come, as they always do, we'll take a page from Michelle's book and bring the team together, face them head on, and lean on that chuckling humor.

Michelle, thank you so much for being Mayhew! You're the best!

LEADING THE WAY: OUTER AND INNER CIRCLE MEMBERS

here are some morning assemblies on Mayhew Island that stand out more than others. Before the bellringer's banter and before the boys hear what's for breakfast, there are those few mornings later in a summer session when a senior staff member stands atop the front porch stairs and shares the traditional line, "Last night, the light was burning bright atop the Island's highest point."

That bright light signifies the induction of a boy into the Island honor societies, otherwise known as the Outer and Inner Circles. As the senior staff member shares some of the highlights from the conversation he and the boy had the night before about all the remarkable things he has done so far and all the hard work he still has before him, he ties a blue bandanna (symbolizing the Outer Circle) or a red bandanna (symbolizing the Inner Circle) around the boy's neck; shakes his hand; and has him go back down to the beach, where in a sea of gray tees and green shorts, those bandannas truly stand-out.

This past summer, 14 boys were inducted into the Outer Circle and 3 of those boys earned the ultimate Mayhew honor of being inducted into the Inner Circle. Tyler, who returned for his second summer, was one of those boys who shined bright and earned both a blue bandanna and a red one. His maturity, positive spirit, and leadership were only a few of the many impressive traits he shared with his peers and the staff this summer. Very early on, Tyler set a goal of being inducted into the Outer Circle and his dedication and perseverance helped him achieve this and much, much more.

Congratulations to Adam, Aisayah, Andre, Brandon, Devin, Devon, Emmett, Eric, Jackson, Maddox, Peter, Richard, Tayler and Tyler for making it to the highest point of the Island and seeing the fire burning bright!

Since 1969, over 1975 boys have participated in the Mayhew Program. Impressively, many have been inducted into the Outer Circle, while almost 2% have earned the distinction of being Inner Circle members.

THE BOYS GIVE TO THE NH FOOD BANK

ollowing the summer, Jim O'Brien, the staff member who is "Mayhew" for the boys in Manchester, picked up two members of Mayhew's honor society, Tayler and Eric, for a trip to the NH Food Bank, where both boys presented Executive Director Mel Gosselin with a contribution from 44 of the 84 boys who spent a month on Mayhew Island this summer (Mayhew serves a total of 193 boys statewide). Among the 44 boys who contributed to the NH Food Bank was Zakary, whose contribution represented more than 8% of the total gift to the Food Bank.



NEWS FROM CIRCLE PROGRAM

fter almost a year of joint planning and creative preparation, the Circle teens showcased their artwork with the help of *The Arts Collaborative* in Meredith, New Hampshire. Professional artist, Heidi Lea Little (a multi-media artist, designer, and arts advocate), along with Circle mentor Shirley Glines, inspired both our middle school and high school Circle teens to incorporate unique art projects into a fundraising showcase to benefit the Circle Program. The Circle girls' projects were displayed alongside the professional artwork of the members of The Arts Collaborative studio.

During the Circle Teen Camp session, Heidi worked with the middle school teens, who created woven mandalas using a variety of mixed-media (cardboard, yarn, fabric, etc.). A mandala is literally a "circle" (how appropriate!) with a calming center point that integrates various shapes and patterns to create a design. Later in the fall, Heidi worked with the high school Circle teens to create painted canvas mandalas. All the mandalas, both woven and painted, were incredibly colorful and showcased the creativity of our girls. The mandalas were so beautiful that the designs were used to create Circle Program notecards. Shirley taught the teens

how to mold chocolate candies. Both the notecards and chocolate were sold at the studio event, and in just one afternoon, the Circle Teens raised \$665 in support of the Circle Program!
